- 1. "How did you become a hero?" "My boat sank." JFK [often there's no choice.]
- 2. Chutzpa: asking for a raise after being late every day. Insolence, gall, audacity; yet it is a form of courage.
- 3. **Bravado:** "Eugene's small fist balled up in his pocket / was just a dry link without a sprocket." SE, a pretense of courage
- 4. "Bravery runs in my family." AR Ammons of cowardice
- 5. "Between cowardice and despair, valor is born." J. Donne
- 6. In the 3-day "war" in Grenada, 1983, 152 Purple Hearts were awarded though only 115 were wounded.
- 7. Why don't most soldiers run away? B/c they don't want to be seen as unworthy by their peers/buddies. All are afraid, but most are afraid of showing it.
- 8. Celebrate cowardice in a children's book in France and get a year in jail. 2009
- 9. "Courage without conscience is a wild beast." Robt. Ingersoll
- Gestapo officer sees photo of anti-war painting Guernica in Picasso's Paris apt. "Did you do this?" "No, you did." c. 1942
- 11. Astronaut to Howard Wolowitz in Big Bang, "You know how astronauts need to have the right stuff?" "Yeah." "Well, the stuff you have is wrong." [He peed his pants during the fitting at NASA]
- 12. **Counting coup** (Fr. strike, blow) was a tradition among Plains Indians warriors to gain prestige by striking or touching an enemy in battle. It was a way to show bravery and intimidate the enemy without killing them. Braver than killing from a distance. Reward? Eagle feather.
- 13. Coup de grace=merciful blow given to wounded beyond human help.
